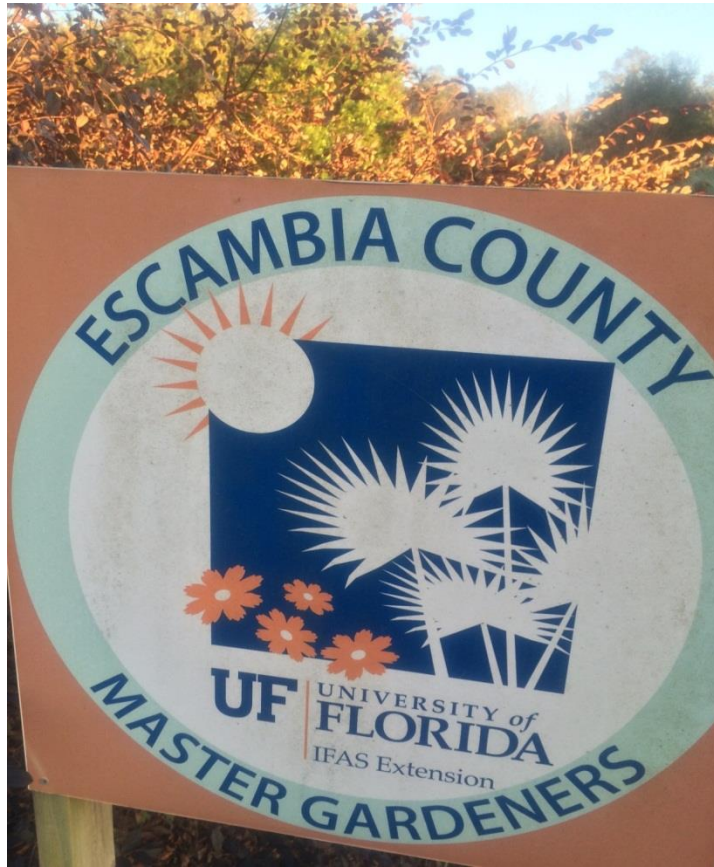


Built by Slaves

Building a large fort on this remote sandy island in the 1800s was a huge undertaking. Because of the efforts of a U.S. Army engineer, Capt. William H. Chase, and hundreds of enslaved workers, the job was completed in five years. Chase allowed the contractor to bring in New Orleans slaves skilled in masonry and carpentry and to use Pensacola slaves as day laborers. Wages for the enslaved workers went to their owners. Ever resourceful, Chase forced local brickyards to lower their prices, and he acquired lime from Maine, sheets of lead from Illinois, and granite from New York.

The fort changed dramatically over the years primarily due to the building of Battery Pensacola inside old Fort Pickens. Removing five feet from the top of the south walls of the old fort in 1916 improved the field of fire for Battery Pensacola.

■ 1916 reconstruction of fort and walls




Under the direction of Army engineers, enslaved workers of African descent framed shales over gun casemates and brick covered walls with lead sheet, and installed granite blocks and iron bolts. A network of fortification (D) which replaced on June 26, 1868.

Protecting Pensacola Bay


In the 1800s the U.S. Army built four fortifications to protect Pensacola Bay and the Navy Yard from a land-based attack. During the Civil War the Confederates briefly held Fort Barrancas, Advanced Redoubt, and Fort McRee and exchanged gunfire with Union forces at Fort Pickens. Needing reinforcements in Tennessee, the Confederates abandoned Pensacola in 1862.

Advanced Redoubt protected the Navy Yard from a land-based attack. During the Civil War the Confederates briefly held Fort Barrancas, Advanced Redoubt, and Fort McRee and exchanged gunfire with Union forces at Fort Pickens. Needing reinforcements in Tennessee, the Confederates abandoned Pensacola in 1862.

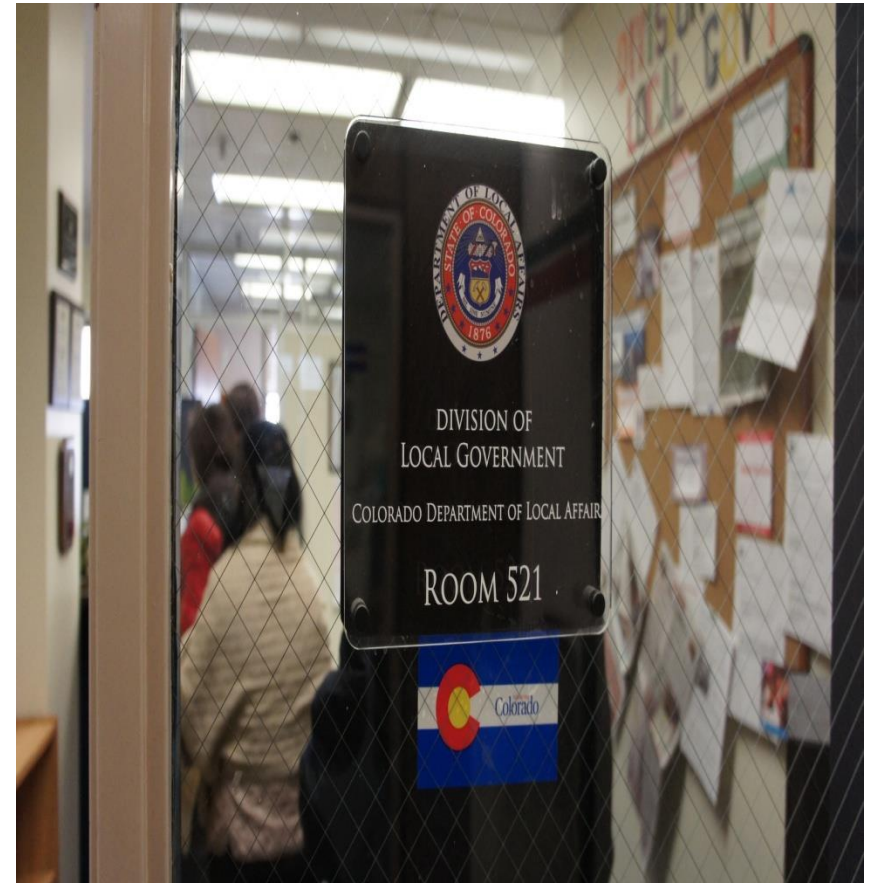


Third System Forts

Americans built harbor forts during the Revolutionary War (first system) and another series between 1789 and 1812 (second system). Forts Barrancas, Pickens, and McRee and Advanced Redoubt were part of the Third System of coastal fortifications built between 1816 and 1870.

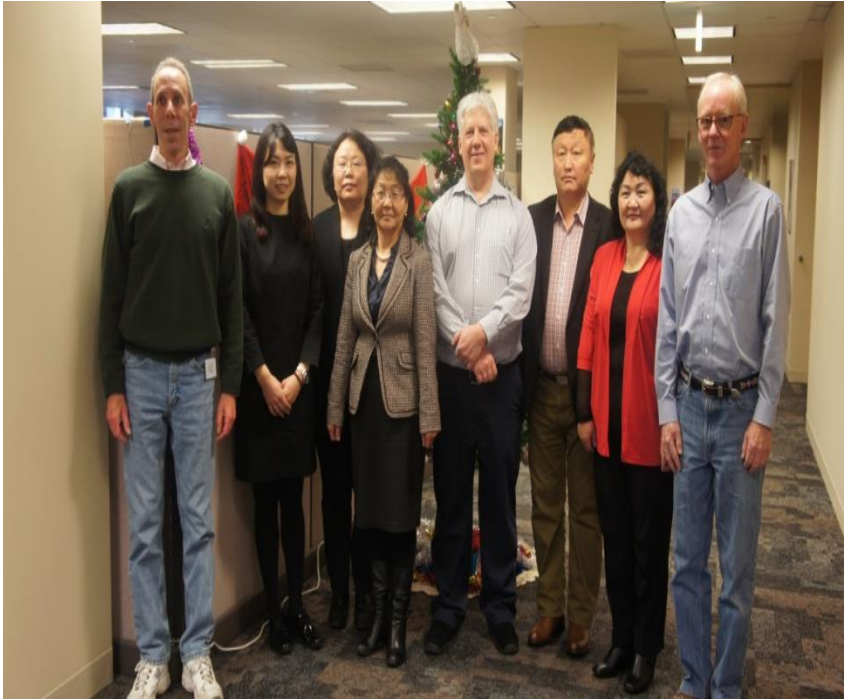

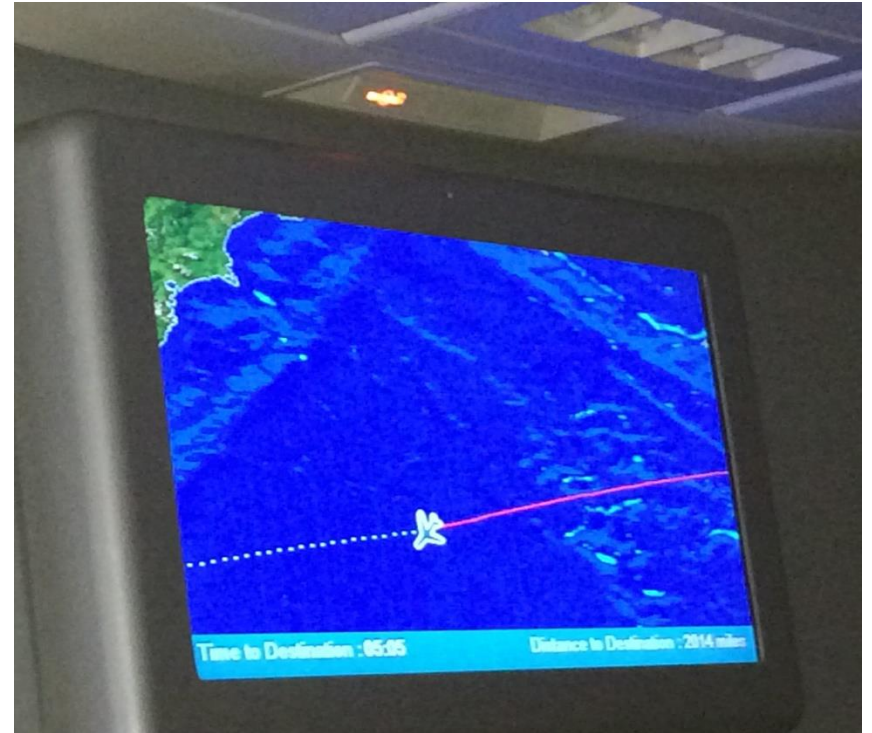
